This half term has also seen the whole school taking part in elections. Each class voted for the children they would like to represent them at the school's pupil parliament. In addition, everyone was able to cast their vote for the Year 6 Lead Ambassadors after hearing their speeches in assembly. Poppy and Betty were elected to these roles and are looking forward to leading the pupil parliament this year. In addition, Year 6 were invited to put themselves forward as House Captains. After some very impressive interviews with myself we picked Scarlett, Christopher, Alex and Arabella to represent their houses. We hope this role will help to further support our house teams across the school.

Thank you to you all for ensuring that your child is in school on time, every day. Even though there seems to have been a huge number of coughs and colds doing the rounds our overall attendance is currently at 94.7% which is just below the national figure. Attendance



Attendance at school is vital if pupils are to reach their full potential. Often, children stay at home when they have a minor illness and they miss out on learning and social experiences.

If your child is very ill, it is important that you seek medical advice – either through your GP, Pharmacist or by contacting NHS Direct on 111.

If your child has a minor illness, often they can manage in school and actually feel better being in school, learning with their friends. Please remember that we have lots of qualified First Aiders in school and a first aid room where your child can go if they feel unwell during the day.

If your child is unwell during the day, we will contact you and discuss with you if they need to go home, or whether to administer some medication to help relieve their symptoms (for example, Calpol or Piriton). Staff are also trained to be able to administer medications which have been prescribed by a Doctor. If you need us to support with the administration of medications during the day, please pop into the school office to see a member of staff.

Remember, if your child is unwell in the morning, they can always come into school later, or after lunch if they feel better.

Year 1 Love Class







Year 2 Trust Class














The term started with a fabulous 'Sensational Start' to our topic of 'Slates to Screens'. The children began learning about what it was like to live in the past by drawing and playing hopscotch on the playground, making peg dolls and creating spinning wheels. It has been wonderful to show the class what our school looked like in the past and how it has changed. The children have studied our school photo albums closely and have been fascinated with how the classroom's, outside area and uniform have evolved over time. In art, we have been learning about mark making with a range of media and how to create texture and tone. The children have created some wonderful still life drawings using all the skills they have learned throughout the unit.

Year 3 Cooperation Class

What a fantastic start the children have had in Year 3, they are working very hard and trying their best!

In Art, the children have produced some fantastic cave art linking to our History about the Stone Age. The children have taken part in drama which has helped when writing their own story 'Stonehenge Boy' based on the book 'Stone Age Boy'. They have enjoyed maths using manipulatives, investigating what to do when there are not enough to subtract from and playing games to reinforce place value. In Science, the children have looked at what makes a balanced diet, the bones in our bodies and muscles and movement. Each week we have been lucky enough to do Forest School with Vicky which the children thoroughly enjoyed as did Miss Swyer and I! it was great to see the chidlnre in a different environment and how they worked together leaving their own learning. They had a brilliant pause day where they learnt about the journey chocolate has before we even see it on the shelf and decorated a box for Harvest. What a jam packed half term!






















Year 4 Resilience Class

What a fantastic start to the year! We have been busy all around. To start the year off we have been looking at digestion in Science, thinking about how our bodies absorb all the nutrients from our food and how to look after our teeth. In Geography, we have carried on the theme of food and health and looked into where our food comes from, even asking our lovely Donna about where our school dinners come from. Discussing the benefits and disadvantages of sourcing our food locally and having it imported. We learnt how we get our chocolate from Cote D'Ivoire and were amazed at all the steps it takes for the cocoa bean to become chocolate bars. The children have also learnt about Fair Trade and the importance of this for farmers all around the world and the small steps that we can take to help them.









Year 4 Cooperation Class

A highlight of the term has been our DT project. The children have been very enthusiastic about learning about the process of improving a product and making it ready for market. They were so excited to taste biscuits on the market, thinking about what ingredients they could add to improve a simple biscuit. We all had so much fun making these and then sharing them with members of staff to conduct our market research and feedback (there was lots of yums and loss of words - and Mr Rogers told us they were the best biscuits he had ever had!)









Year 5 Courage Class

Year 5 have travelled back to Ancient Greece in their history lessons this term and thought about the legacy that the Ancient Greeks left behind. We have learnt about the beginnings of democracy and how the independent city-states were governed. We have learnt about the first philosophers, the Greek Gods and Goddesses and have enjoyed discovering Greek myths and legends. This has tied in nicely with our class text: 'Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief' by Rick Riordan.











Year 5 Courage Class

Back in class. year 5 have investigated mixtures and separation in science - we have made mixtures, sieved and filtered mixtures, made solutions, investigated the effects of increasing water temperature when dissolving solids and made our own salt plains to investigate evaporation.





In art, we have experimented with different materials and ideas in our unit on mixed media self portraits. The children looked at the work of Chila Kumari Burman for inspiration and then used different materials to express their ideas. There were some amazing results!







Our creativity continued in our musical theatre unit where the children worked in groups to perform a song describing a journey. This was a test of team work as much as creativity and musicality. Everyone did brilliantly and produced four completely different but equally fantastic performances which combined dancing, singing and acting.

Year 6 Respect Class



Year 6 have settled into life at the top of the school. Poppy and Betty were elected as Lead Ambassadors and were called upon to welcome visitors to school on our Open Morning. Scarlett, Alex, Arabella and Christopher bravely went for an interview and were chosen to be House Captains. This is a role that we are developing, generating a sense of belonging for each house.



In terms of learning, we have been historians exploring censuses; scientists classifying living things; authors exploring adventure narratives; journalists writing crime reports and artists practicing the technique of chiaroscuro. We have problem solved in maths and developed our maths vocabulary and understanding; we have explored whether images are real or Al generated. Optical illusions have helped us to understand religion and we have learned to discuss and debate using respectful sentence starters.



Two Young Carers from class brought our Young Carer's Day to life by talking to the class about their experiences and the impact they feel day-to-day which was so powerful for all of us.



A group of the class have also begun a pilot scheme run by The Rotary Club which is a mini Duke Of Edinburgh style award scheme. We are excited to have been chosen for this scheme and thank The Rotary Club for the opportunity.

Thanks also to the Quick Response Memorial Woodland in Abinger, who have invited us to take part in their Remembrance Service on 11th November which is our first chance to represent the school outside.

Dear Parent/Carer

If you consider that there are exceptional circumstances relating to your request, please let the school have full details. Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis.

Penalty Notices to Address Poor Attendance at School

A Penalty Notice may be issued as an alternative to the prosecution of a parent/carer for their child's unauthorised absence from school (absence without the agreement of the school or not covered by a medical note) and will be used by Surrey County Council in the following circumstances:-

- 1. Pupils identified by police and Attendance Advice Officers (formerly Inclusion Officers) engaged on Truancy Patrols and who have incurred unauthorised absences.
- 2. Leave of absence in term time (5 days or 10 sessions or more).

Please be aware that the School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024

state that Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances.

They may request that Surrey County Council issue Penalty Notices when the absence is not authorised.

Warnings will not be given where it can be shown that parents have been notified that such absences will not be authorised.

3. Finally, the issuing of a Penalty Notice will also be considered where it is judged that a parent is failing to ensure their child's regular school attendance.

This will be considered when a pupil has incurred 10 or more unauthorised sessions in the previous 10 school weeks, which may include a pupil arriving late after close of registration.

If you believe at any stage that your child's absence from school may leave you liable to receive a Penalty Notice, it is extremely important that you act without delay to secure their regular attendance.

If you have any questions or require further support to achieve an improvement in your child's attendance, please contact your child's school or the Attendance Advice Officer.

Surrey County Council is not responsible for authorising pupil absence and therefore cannot withdraw any Penalty Notice requests without the written permission of the Headteacher.

Penalty Notice relating to Exclusions

If a child is excluded from school, Section 103 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 places a duty on parents/carers to ensure that their child is not in a public place without justifiable cause during school hours.

This duty applies to the *first five days of each exclusion*. Failure to do so will render the parent/carer liable to a Penalty Notice. (Alternative education provision will be made available from the sixth day of any exclusion.)

Amount Payable for a Penalty Notice and Consequences for repeat unauthorised absences

- 1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- 1. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, **per parent/carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in The Magistrates Court.
- If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice –Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per
